

1 Phillip J. Braun North & South

A short walk from Pellston, the 125-acre Braun North Preserve lies along nearly a mile of the Maple River, a fly-fishing destination. A trail takes you to and along the river. From US-31 and Robinson Rd, head west ¼ mile on Robinson Road. Preserve entrance is on the south.

Braun South lies just south of Pellston and offers 32 acres and 1500 feet of Maple River frontage. From US-31 in Pellston, head 1.8 miles south to the preserve sign on east side of road. A two track heads east half a mile, then down a slope to the Maple River.



8 Elmer Johnston

Old logging trails offer nearly two miles of hiking opportunities and spectacular views of Lake Michigan and Beaver Island from this 220-acre preserve. Portions of the land were once tilled as farmland and used as pasture. A mix of rolling hardwoods and open meadowland can be found.

From Harbor Springs, take State Rd. 9 miles to Robinson Rd. Turn left on Robinson and travel 4 miles to Church Rd. Take a right on Church and travel ½ mile to the Johnston Preserve on the right.



15 CITY OF PETOSKEY'S Skyline Trail

The Conservancy assisted the City of Petoskey with acquiring this parcel and constructing an overlook platform offering spectacular views of the Petoskey region. The addition is now part of the North County Trail system.

From Petoskey, head east on Mitchell St. 1.7 miles to Division Rd. Right on Division. 8 miles to Atkins Rd. Left on Atkins. 5 miles to Cedar Valley Rd. Right on Cedar Valley .5 mile. Take first left onto Greenwood and follow around curve ½ miles to 4-way intersection. Go straight (south) for 1 mile. Turn right onto Krause Rd. and parking area is on the right 1 mile down at the media towers.

2 Bubbling Springs

Just a few miles from downtown Petoskey, this 15-acre preserve offers a short trail system and overlook offering a natural oasis for exploration. While enjoying a mix of mature upland hardwood forest and a swampy corridor with a small stream, try to find the springs.

From the intersection of US-31 and US-131 in Petoskey, travel south on US-131 1½ miles to Interwoven Rd. Turn right (west) on interwoven and travel 1.1 miles to the preserve on the left side of the road.



9 Ray Johnston

Near Pickrel Lake, this 52-acre preserve includes more than one mile of trails, part of which travel through a steep bluff created by post-glacial Lake Algonquin.

From the intersection of M-119 and US-31 on the north end of Petoskey, follow US-31 ½ mile to Pickrel Lake Rd. Turn right and follow Pickrel Lake Rd. for approximately 7½ miles (the road has several confusing turns at intersections, so watch the road signs). Turn left on Ellsworth Road, go about one mile, and turn left on Artesian Lane. Look for parking area and preserve sign.

3 Fochtman

This 243-acre preserve includes ¼ mile of frontage along Round Lake and ¼ mile along US-31. The best way to see it is to hike the paved North Western State Trail. A boardwalked overlook on the east end of Round Lake marks the southwest end of the preserve. Hike the trail north and the preserve is on both sides.

From the north end of Petoskey on US-31, turn onto M-119 towards Harbor Springs and go .8 mile. Turn right on Hiliwatha Trail. Travel 1.2 miles and park on the left at the paved pull-off next to the lake by the overlook platform.



10 Allan and Virginia McCune

Approximately three miles of trail loops can be enjoyed at this 168-acre property with more than ½ mile frontage on Minnehaha Creek. Dominated by hardwoods, the preserve includes a pine plantation, meadow, and significant cedar swamp. A second parking area large enough to accommodate a school bus was completed off Berger Road in 2015.

From Petoskey, take Mitchell Road east 6.25 miles to Berger Road (turn right and go .7 mile to parking on left) or 7 miles east of Petoskey to Maxwell Road (turn right and .7 miles to parking on right).



16 STATE OF MICHIGAN'S Sturgeon Bay Dunes

With 750 acres and nearly a mile of Lake Michigan shoreline, this protected property is now a part of Wilderness State Park. It is one of the most spectacular public beaches available in northern lower Michigan. No formal trails on property, but the North Country Trail can be accessed from several points nearby offering biking and hiking opportunities.

From Cross Village, follow M-119 north along the coast approximately 5 miles until it dead ends at Sturgeon Bay Trail. Turn left and you will soon be at public shoreline with many parking options.



22 Barney's Lake - Beaver Island

This preserve includes 337 acres, 4,900 feet of Barney's Lake frontage and 1,770 feet of Lake Michigan frontage. Features include open bog, sedge meadow, cedar swamp, and uplands. Nearly a mile of trail is found on the east of the lake. A second trail and sign are found at the north end of the preserve off of Barney's Lake Road. From there, hike .7 mile to connect to the Kuebler Trail. From St. James, take Kings Hwy, south 1¼ miles to Barney's Lake Rd. North and turn right. Go 2½ miles and the preserve can be found on both sides of the road. Look for a preserve sign on the left. Parking is on the right.



29 CHARLEVOIX TOWNSHIP'S North Point

LTC assisted Charlevoix Township and the local community in acquiring this Lake Michigan parcel in 1988. These 27 acres and ½ mile of Lake Michigan shore lie adjacent to the Mt. McSauba Recreation Area. A network of trails run between the dunes and include a lake overlook.

From US-31 on the far north end of Charlevoix, take Mercer Rd. north (toward the lake). Turn left on Maple and then right on McSauba. Look for parking on your left near the sign or continue to the parking/turn around near the lakeshore.



36 Susan Creek

A 1½ mile trail system allows you to explore these 314 acres which include a mile of frontage on Susan Creek and a mile along US-31. Lies adjacent to the land and trails of the 55-acre Taimi Hoag Preserve owned by Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians. A new parking area was created in Spring, 2016.

Four miles east of Charlevoix and 11 miles west of Petoskey, the entrance to Susan Creek is across from the Little Traverse Wheelway. Parking and a green gate are on the south side of US-31 a few hundred yards southeast of the entrance to the Big Rock Restoration Site.



37 Wissner-Saworski

Located off US-131 just south of Boyne Falls, this 36-acre preserve was donated so that others could enjoy its existing trail system, diverse habitats, and rolling terrain. Adjacent to the school's 160-acre forest. An overlook platform exists at the preserve's highest point with plans to maintain a view of Boyne Valley.

From the light at the US-131 intersection in Boyne Falls, continue 1½ miles south along US-131. Turn left onto Metros Rd. Cross the railroad tracks and parking area is on left.



46 Birge/Mertaguh/Nye Complex

This 813-acre complex features beautiful wildflowers, excellent migratory bird habitat, and more than two miles of Lake Huron shore. A 2.2-mile trail wanders through the cedar forest area and wetlands from the most northern parking area. A separate, short (1 mile) trail takes visitors to scenic Loon Lake. And a third trail to Search Bay is available from the most southern parking.

From Hessel, take M-134 west 2.4 miles. Turn left on Pt. Brulee Rd. Go .7 miles to the first trailhead parking on right; or go 1.1 miles to shoreline parking area (on left). Travel further south for the Loon Lake and Search Bay parking.



47 William B. Derby

This 200-acre preserve includes a nearly three-mile figure eight trail loop available through all seasons. The trail meanders through natural meadow covered rock gardens, evergreen forest, and along the rugged Lake Huron shore. Because of its easy access to town, this preserve is becoming a local favorite and trails are generally compacted for snowshoeing in the winter.

From M-134, head south on Four Mile Road to Club Road. Take a right on Club Road and travel half a mile. Look for signs on right and parking area is a little further up on the left.



38 Agnes S. Andreae

A mile of hiking trails and a bridge crossing the Pigeon River are features of the 181-acre Andreae Preserve with a mile of river frontage. A rustic cabin can be reserved by community groups (call 231.347.0091). Combined with trails at the adjacent Banwell Preserve, more than 5 miles of trails are available.

From Indian River (exit 310 off I-75) take M-68 east 4½ miles. Turn left onto Old Onaway Rd. Look for "Cochrane Lake Public Access" sign). Go north on Old Onaway Rd 1.7 miles to Riverwood Rd. and turn right. At the Intersection with Big Sky Trail, look for Andreae Preserve sign.



48 CLARK TOWNSHIP'S Hessel Beach

As LTC's very first assist project in the Les Cheneaux area, since 1994 this township park has offered free parking, a place to carry kayaks and canoes to the water, a swimming beach, and public restrooms. An excellent launch point for paddlers who are headed out to LTC's Marquette Island preserves.

From the corner of M-134 and S. Pickford Ave/3 Mile Rd, go south into downtown Hessel about two blocks until the street ends at the public marina. Turn right onto Lake St. Go about 600 feet. The Township beach has street level parking on the left.



4 Goodhart Farms

One of LTC's largest nature preserves boasts 685 acres and 7½ miles of marked trails with 5½ miles that are groomed for cross-country skiing. Trails are divided into East and West sections.

From Harbor Springs, take State Rd. north 9 miles to Robinson Rd. Turn left on Robinson and travel 3½ miles to the beginning of the preserve at the Hinman Rd. intersection. East trails are most easily accessed from the first parking area you see off Robinson Road, which is also open in the winter. West Trails are accessed from Church Road.



11 Naas, Mauger, Raunecker and Leslie Complex

These adjacent preserves total 45 acres just a few blocks west of downtown Harbor Springs. A trail connects local roads forming a neighborhood path through the preserves, including boardwalk across the wet regions.

From Main St. in downtown Harbor Springs, travel west past Holy Childhood Church until the road intersects with Traverse St. Take a right and travel 4 blocks to Fourth St. Turn left. The preserve entrance is about ¼ mile on the left.



18 Thorne Swift

Three easy trails cover 30 acres of wetlands and uplands, taking you to a pond and to the beach. This is the only LTC preserve with a formal nature center and regular summer programs. A \$5 parking fee per car for non-township residents. (No charge for LTC members.) Open Memorial Day to Labor Day, 10 am to ½ hour after sunset. Call 231.526.6401 for extended hours. Managed by West Traverse Township.

From Harbor Springs, take M-119 northwest 3.8 miles to Lower Shore Dr. on left. Follow Lower Shore Dr. for ½ mile. The preserve sign is on the left.



25 Nathan "Barry" Driggers

A 1½ mile trail system meanders through this 75-acre preserve offering views of Lake Charlevoix. Once a farm, the property includes a pine plantation, open fields, and a hillside forested with oaks. It is often groomed by a neighbor in winter.

From the intersection of US-31 just north of Charlevoix, head east on the Boyne City-Charlevoix Road and travel 5.3 miles. The preserve is found on the left (north) side of the road. This preserve is directly across the street from Hayes Township's Camp Seagull property.



32 Raven Ridge

140 acres and 1½ miles of hilly trails adjacent to the Raven Hill Discovery Center near East Jordan. Overlook platform with scenic views.

From Boyne Falls, take M-75 for one mile to Deer Lake Road. Turn left on Deer Lake Road and travel 3.2 miles to East Jordan/Boyne City Rd. Turn left and go .1 mile to parking area on the right. Within 50 feet, turn left on Fuller Rd. Go up the big hill past Raven Hill Discovery Center until you reach a "T" Turn left (Rogers Rd. but no sign). The parking area is a short distance down on the right.



39 Boyd B. Banwell

Adjacent to the Andreae Preserve, the 400-acre Banwell Family Preserve adds more than four miles of connected trails. This preserve includes nearly 3 miles of Pigeon River frontage. A parking area off of M-68 and connecting trail were completed in 2015.

From Indian River (exit 310 off I-75) take M-68 east about 5.3 miles. Parking area and sign on the left. To a more remote parking area, in Alton turn left (W) onto Quincey Road, and travel north. Turn left (W) onto Dunn Rd., a seasonal gravel road. Go about ½ mile. The preserve entrance (grated 2-track) is on the left just past where Dunn Rd. turns to the north.



49 Marquette Island Preserves

More than 1,900 acres and five miles of Lake Huron shoreline are protected with the Seiberling-Stewart, Aldo Leopold, and Sheppard-Hardy preserves on this island within Les Cheneaux. (Leopold is 1,683 acres alone.) Best way to access main trail is through Leopold Preserve is at the Leopold Landing at Duck Bay.

From the Mackinac Bridge, follow I-75 north about 14 miles to M-134. Take M-134 east 13 miles to Hessel. An excellent access point for launches in Hessel or further east in Cedarville. Only accessible by boat.



5 Hailand/Helstrom Complex

Access these preserves off of West Conway Road near Oden or from the North Western State Trail where a platform and boardwalk leads you into the preserves and 1½ miles of hiking trail. The waters from these lands drain to Crooked Lake nearby. Hailand Preserve (50 acres) lies adjacent to the Helstrom Family Preserve (40 acres).

At the Conway stop light along US-31, turn left onto West Conway Rd. and in .2 miles you will see sign and parking on the right. Or catch the paved trail at the fountain and go north about a hundred yards to access the preserves through the boardwalk platform.



12 Oden Island

A rare island of its size within an inland lake, Oden Island is accessed by a causeway. The 50-acre preserve offers a parking area, nearly a mile of foot trails, trampoline benches, and views along a mile of lake frontage. When weather is right, this is a fun kayak destination.

From Petoskey, take US-31 north 3¼ miles to Pickrel Lake Rd. Turn right and follow 4 miles until Pickrel turns into Channel Rd. Follow Channel Rd. 1 mile to Oden Island Rd and turn left. Once on the island, turn right on Leeward Dr. and go all the way to the end until you see the LTC logo sign.



19 Waldron Fen

This 158-acre property includes a nearly two-mile trail loop around the primary wetlands offering exceptional birding and an easy walk through diverse habitats. A small covered picnic table is found just off of the parking area. This preserve is in the process of being restored to native species.

From Petoskey, head north on US-31 to Pickrel Lake Rd. Follow 9.5 miles to Banwell Rd. and turn left. Continue on Banwell ¾ mile to entrance on right. From Alanson, head east on M-68 to Banwell Rd. Turn right. Continue on Banwell 3.3 miles to entrance on left.



26 Horton Creek Complex

Six nature preserves along Horton Creek combine for 284 acres and 2.25 miles of stream frontage. A parking area is available along Pinchery Road. Visit the website or app (LTC Explorer) for specifics and updated information.

To get to Taylor-Fronton Creek Preserve, from Charlevoix, take US-31 east two miles and turn right on Boyne City-Charlevoix Road. Go 8.6 miles, and turn left on Pinchery Rd. Go north 2.1 miles on Pinchery. The parking lot is on the right, about a half mile north of the Schulz Preserve parking.



33 Rogers/Dressel/Jordan River

These preserves combine for a total of 201 acres and more than two miles of Jordan River frontage. An easy 1½ mile trail system is on the Rogers Preserve. Just upstream from this complex lies a public access/canoe launch, making for a nice paddling destination that ends in East Jordan at the edge of Lake Charlevoix.

From downtown East Jordan, travel northeast and then south on M-32 for 1.3 miles to Rogers Road. Turn left and the Rogers Preserve is ½ mile down on the right.



40 UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN'S/LTC'S Colonial Point/Chaboiganing

A total of 482 acres and more than 2½ miles of easy trails make for excellent hiking and cross country skiing through the open fields and towering oaks and pines of these adjacent lands. Hunting is allowed on Colonial Point but not on Chaboiganing.

From Petoskey, travel 14 miles north on US-31 and turn right on Brutus Rd. Travel 4 miles. Just past the intersection with Mumdt Rd. look for the Chaboiganing Preserve entrance on right. For the Colonial Point property, continue straight and take the next right. Go a few hundred yards to the Colonial Point entrance on your right.



50 St. Helena Island

When crossing the Mackinac Bridge, look west and the largest island visible (~7 miles away) is St. Helena. LTC owns the entire 266-acre island except for the lighthouse and three surrounding acres which are owned by the Great Lakes Lighthouse Keepers Association (GLLKA).

Access limited to boat travel. Nearest boat ramps are St. Ignace, Point La Barbe, and Mackinaw City. Anchor at boat or land a kayak at the sheltered bay near the old village site on the north side of the island. GLLKA offers a variety of ways to get to the island: www.gllka.com or 231.436.5580.



6 EMMET COUNTY'S The Headlands

Little Traverse Conservancy assisted Emmet County in acquiring this incredible 600-acre property with 2½ miles on the Straits of Mackinac. Designated as the 9th International Dark Sky Park in the world. Nearly 4½ miles of trails are available. For more information, call 231.436.4051 or visit www.emmetcounty.org.

From Mackinaw City, take Central Ave. west for 2 miles to its end. Turn left and go .3 mile to the entrance road on the right. A kiosk is found shortly on the right.



13 Offield Family

At 390 acres, this preserve includes nearly 4 miles of trails and two parking areas. Largely wooded and hilly with some large meadows. This is a popular neighborhood preserve within a short distance of Harbor Springs, the downhill ski resorts, and several golf courses.

From Petoskey, head north on US-31 2.6 miles to M-119. Turn left, follow M-119 for 3.2 miles to Pleasantview Rd., continue north on Pleasantview 1½ miles to Oude Rd and turn left. Once on parking area on left ½ mile down Quick Rd. Parking also off Hedrick Rd. on preserve's west side.



20 Watson and Schott Complex

These two adjacent preserves combine for a total of 104 acres located between Petoskey and Harbor Springs. A roughly one-mile trail loop spanning both preserves was completed Summer 2015.

To get to the main trailhead, from the Harbor Springs Airport, head south along M-119 roughly a half mile. Take a left (east) on Wood-village Road and travel a half mile. Take a right (south) on Mink Road and you will dead end at the parking area to the trail.



27 Little Sand Bay - Beaver Island

This 116-acre preserve includes a mix of shrubs, cedar swamp, and sand dunes. A short trail (.4 mile) and footbridges allow visitors to explore without damaging the sensitive habitat. When added with state land to the north, nearly 1½ miles of Lake Michigan shoreline with a shallow swimming beach are accessible.

From the Welles's Airport, go south on East Side Dr. for approximately 200 yards. Look for a sign on the left side of the road. Parking is adjacent to the historic Gallagher House.



34 St. Clair Lake/Six Mile Lake

Jointly managed between the Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy and LTC, this 261-acre property offers 2.3 miles of water frontage. A launch is available for canoes or kayaks and a short hike leads to a platform overlooking St. Clair Lake near the headwaters of the Chain of Lakes.

In Ellsworth, take C-48 east approximately two miles to South Arm Township Park and a small parking area on the right (south) side of the road. There is a rustic boat launch on the river.



41 Helmer's Dam/Robert D. VanCampen

Mostly wooded, the primary feature of this 200-acre property is the 1¼ miles of Pigeon River frontage. A trail leads to the river which is a popular destination for fly anglers.

From Indian River, take M-68 east 5¼ miles to Afton Rd. Turn right and travel 1.3 miles. Preserve on the left where Cut Off Road branches to the right.



51 Bailey-Lagerstrom - Sugar Island

More than 422 acres and two miles of St. Mary's River/Lake Huron shore. From the parking area, a mile-long trail stops along the lake.

From downtown Sault Ste Marie, go east to the Sugar Island ferry. Once on the island, drive 3.7 miles east on 1½ Mile Rd. Turn right on Brassier Rd. Drive 11 miles south on Brassier (which turns into Homestead Rd. after about 4 ½ miles). The parking area is on Homestead Rd. on the right at a big curve. Give yourself at least 25 minutes to get back to the ferry. The ferry returns to the mainland on the hour and half hour.



7 Hoogland Family

This 100-acre preserve lies along nearly 3,000 feet of M-119/Tunnel of Trees Scenic Heritage Route. The property rises to rolling ridges to the east and is dominated by large red oaks, but includes the classic northern upland forest. In late spring, the woods are dotted with trillium, trout lily, and spring beauty.

From Harbor Springs, drive north on M-119 for 7.7 miles. At the base of the big hill you have just descended, you will turn a fairly sharp corner to the right and the parking area will soon appear on the right. Look for a small road side pull off with gate and small sign.



14 Round Lake

Located next to the Conservancy office, this 58-acre preserve with a half mile of frontage on Round Lake offers easy, close-to-town trails totaling almost a mile. An overlook platform offers a nice view of Round Lake. The preserve is easily accessible from the Little Traverse Wheelway near the Petoskey State Park.

From US-31 in Petoskey, take M-119 about 1½ miles north to Powell Rd. Turn right on Powell and take the first driveway on the right, also the entrance to the LTC office. The trailhead is directly off of the parking lot.



21 Woollam Family

A trail system was completed in Spring 2016 for this spectacular Lake Michigan shoreline preserve. From the parking area, a hilly trail takes you just under a half mile to the water. The back dunes feature an unusual rock landscape and the beach is classic northern Lake Michigan shore.

From Harbor Springs, travel north on State Road 14 miles to Division Road. Take a left and travel 1.8 miles to Lakeshore Drive/M-119. Turn right and travel .9 miles to the parking area on your left (west side). From Cross Village, the preserve is roughly 1.7 miles south on M-119 on the west side of the road.



28 CENTRAL MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY'S Miller's Marsh - Beaver Island

Miller's Marsh is the largest and most diverse true marsh found on the island. A one mile trail provides easy access around the marsh.

From St. James, take the King's Hwy. south for 4 miles. Turn right (west) onto Paid Een Ogs Rd. Continue about 1¼ miles. At the four corners and airport turn left (south) onto West Side Dr. Continue on West Side Dr. approximately five miles to Miller's Marsh which will be on the left (east) side of the road.




35 Sleepy Hollow

More than one mile of easy walking trails meander through this 55-acre property that includes a spring-fed trout stream emptying to the South Arm of Lake Charlevoix. Beautiful second growth forest of maple, beech, hemlock, and ash.

From Charlevoix, take M-66 south approximately 7 miles and turn left onto Sleepy Hollow Lane, across the road from Phelps Rd. Drive in to the parking area on the left.






