

With your help, this land will be forever protected.






The nature preserve will be called Enji-minozhiiyaamigak, an Anishinaabemowin word for "The Place of Peacefulness". This is an inclusive term, a place of serenity and calmness for all living things: people, animals, trees, plants, and everything there and passing through. When this land is protected, anyone driving along US-31 will see the sign for this preserve and know that it is a place for all.


