

Hiawatha National Forest/ Search Bay Nature Preserve

Hiawatha National Forest's Search Bay features a beach at the road end that is great for launching paddlecraft. Depending on water level, there is a small boat launch on the west side of the bay. Nearly surrounded by the national forest is Search Bay Nature Preserve. There are more trails off of the road for exploring. Take a compass or GPS.

From the blinking light in Hessel, travel 4.5 miles west on M-134, take a left on Road #3436 (please note this road is not plowed in the winter). Several trails branch off the main gravel road. To reach Lake Huron, follow the

Birge/Mertaugh/Nye Nature Preserve Complex

This 889-acre complex features beautiful wildflowers, excellent migratory bird habitat and nearly three miles of Lake Huron shoreline between all the preserves on either side of Point Brulee Rd. There are several trail and

From Hessel, take M-134 west 2.4 miles. Turn left on Point Brulee Rd and head south. The first parking area, with a 2-mile long hiking trail, will be 0.7 miles from M-134 on the right. Shoreline access to Mismer and Hessel Bays is 0.4 miles further on the left. The short Loon Lake overlook trail is in between these on the right (west); park along the side of the road. The Mertaugh/Search Bay trail is 0.5 miles further south from the shoreline access parking area. You will be turning right off Point Brulee Rd and signs will direct you to parking and the

This is an easy, two-track, gravel road that heads north into maple woods and mixed conifer swamps. Various trails sprout off into the woods from the main road. *There* are more trails off of the road for

exploring. Take a compass or GPS.

Travel about 3 miles west of Hessel and turn right onto Road #3433. Head north for about 1 mile for multiple trail spurs to explore. Small pullouts for parking are located periodically along the road.

Hessel Beach

This township park offers free parking, a place to carry kayaks and canoes to the water, a sandy swimming beach, picnic tables, benches, and public restrooms. An excellent access point for paddlers who are headed out to the islands.

From the corner of M-134 and 3 Mile Rd, go south into downtown Hessel. About two blocks down, the street ends at the public marina. Turn right onto Lake St for about 600 feet. The township beach has street parking on

Hessel Airport Trail/ Cedarville Wastewater

A complex network of trails laces the A multi-use two-track trail runs through the woods between Hessel and Cedarville with more than 700 acres of state forest land to explore. Starting to the east, the township's wastewater ponds offer an excellent opportunity for waterfowl birding. The west side is wooded and allows access to multi-use trails. Narrow trails, sand, hills, wet areas, and ruts make this trail best-suited for hiking, mountain or fat tire bikes, dirt bikes, or ATVS. Sections may be impassable for some vehicles.

> To Hessel Airport: At the blinking light in Hessel on M-134, head north on 3 Mile Rd for 2.2 miles. Just past the airstrip, turn right. To park, take the right fork to parking near the ball field.

To Wastewater Ponds: From the blinking light on M-134 in Hessel, head east for 2.7 miles. Turn left onto Blindline Rd and travel north for 1.4 miles to a dirt road on the left located on the north side of the ponds.

Snows Heritage Park

This park is situated adjacent to Clark Township Hall in Cedarville. It includes a picnic pavilion, ball diamonds, horseshoe pits, pickleball /tennis courts, public restrooms, and a natural area. A storybook trail and short nature trail are found at the north end of the park by the horseshoe pits.

From M-134 at the blinking light in Hessel, travel 2.7 miles to Blindline Rd. Turn left on Blindline Rd for 0.1 mile. The entrance and parking area will be on your left, south of Township Hall





William B. Derby Nature Preserve

This 200-acre preserve includes a three-mile figure eight trail loop available through all seasons. The trail meanders through rock garder forest, and along the rugged Lake

From M-134, head south on S 4-Mile Block Rd. Take a right on Club Rd and travel 0.5 miles. Look for signs on right parking area is a little further up on the

Aldo Leopold Nature Preserve

This 1,683 acre preserve on Marquette Island, the Little Traverse Conservancy's largest, includes 3.8 miles of Lake Huron shoreline. On Liberty Bay, there is a rustic trail that connects with Clark Township's Leopold Landing (see #12). Portions are seasonally wet.

Owned by The Nature Conservancy, this 185-acre preserve features over a mile of forested trail that leads to 4,300 feet of Lake Huron. A great preserve to see and hear multitudes

From Cedarville (intersection of M-134 and M-129) travel east on M-134 for 6.2 miles and look for the preserve sign on the right/south side of the highway. A parking lot is available at

This network of historic logging roads provides an interesting, scenic link between M-134 to the south and M-48 to the north. The area is characterized by hardwoods, mixed conifer forest, mature aspen and maple stands along a rolling sandy landscape. The roads wind through Lake Superior State Forest and some private acreage, so please note "no trespassing" signage when visiting this area. Low, Springer, and Ziegler roads are rough dirt roads used by loggers, but shared by

Sandy (Low) Rd is 10.4 miles east of the M-129/M-134 intersection on the north side. Heading north, it intersects with Springer Rd which goes all the

DeTour Peninsula **Nature Preserve**

More than three miles of northern Lake Huron shoreline and 145 acres on Point DeTour. From the parking area, a twotrack trail leads through the middle of the preserve with short trails to the lake. Please be respectful of private property. Experienced paddlers can access the shoreline by launching from the small launch near Malette Park.
